The ACSH and the Working Party "Climate Change"

The Advisory Committee on Health and Safety at Work

 Tripartite body that "assists the Commission in the preparation, implementation and evaluation of activities in the field of occupational safety and health (OSH) and facilitates cooperation between national administrations, trade unions and employers' organisations."

The Working Party "Climate Change"

- 4+1 members of each interest group
- WIG-Members from Germany, Greece, the Netherlands, Spain and a European federation

Objective: Having an opinion until the plenary in November

Current state of play

Problem

- There are good solutions at the company or sectoral level, but not all can be transferred to other companies (e.g. wage agreement for roofers)
- In a recent survey by the German social accidence insurance, less than one third of the respondents answered that the effects of climate change on OSH have been tackled in their company

Our demands as trade unions

- We want concrete action and solutions
- We want to focus on heat
- But: dedicated directive or adjustments to existing legislation?

Future challenges

Position of the employers

- Framework directive already obligates employers to have adequate risk assessment and measures
- Lack of awareness and information is the main problem

Role of government representatives in the working party

Also view heat as the main issue to be tackled and also see the necessity for legislative action

What is more:

- Not easy to isolate individual risk factors
- Mandate is very demanding
